### **MV Art Class Welcomes Guests**

The Fine Arts Visual class at Ozarka College in Mountain View, led by instructor, Cheri McKee-McSwain, learned

about the art of pine needle weaving from guest presenter Lara Sanders on September 22, 2009.

Sanders, who has been weaving with pine needles for approximately eight years, has exhibited her art at the Arkansas Craft Guild Gallery for the last three years. She also participates in other area

events. Her work is high quality and composed of only natural materials.

Her Cherokee heritage prompted Sanders to learn pine needle weaving, working with not only Ponderosa needles and Long leaf needles, but also incorporating gourds, river cane and reeds. She discussed and demonstrated to Ozarka students her craft in using the needles, beeswax-covered sinew, a method of boiling black walnuts to obtain a natural dye, and how pine pitch is used on baskets for waterproofing.

Sanders brought along many of her weavings, including necklaces and medicine bags. She pointed out that medicine bags are considered extremely private to the owner and therefore untouchable unless given permission.

McKee-McSwain goes to great lengths to expose students in her art classes a diverse range of art styles and mediums. She recently took students on a private tour of artists who participate in the Off the Beaten Path Studio Tour. McKee-McSwain states, "This has become a tradition for this class and is one of the biggest highlights of the Fall semester for the students. Ozarka is truly indebted to these individuals for their hospitality and interest in our students!" The following artists/artisans opened their studio doors to Ozarka students on September 25th: Sue Coon, painter; Leon Creasey, woodturner; David & Becki Dahlstedt, potters; and Pat Thompson & Scott Reidy, blacksmiths. Last year 3 million volunteers across the nation decided to spend the last Saturday in October helping their communities and others accomplish thousands of projects in hundreds of towns. If you could spare the

time, we all know our communities would appreciate the help. So this Oct. 24<sup>th</sup>, lend someone a helping hand and participate on Make a Difference Day.

October is also celebrated as the National Breast Cancer Awareness Month. Early detection is very import by self examinations and yearly mammograms. Free or low-cost mammograms are available for women without health insurance in many locations. For a program near you, contact the CDC at (888) 842-6355.

Breast cancers that are found because they are causing symptoms tend to be larger and are more likely to have already spread beyond the breast. In contrast, breast cancers found during screening exams are more likely to be smaller and still confined to the breast. The

size of a breast cancer and how far it has spread are some of the most important factors in predicting the *prognosis* (outlook) of a woman with this disease.
