Ozarka College Participates in Second Cultural Exchange

Ozarka College Cultural Anthropology students in Mountain View held a second online exchange with students from Gorno Altaysk State University in Siberia on Tuesday, April 6th. The exchange was conducted using Skype technology and was entitled *Working Together: Applied Anthropology and Applied Science: Anthropologists and Biologists Working to Benefit Communities.*



Cultural Anthropology instructor, John C. Van Orman invited Biology instructor, David Mitchell and his biology students to join in the conference since the focus of the discussion was measuring and managing water quality.

Special guest speakers for the Mountain View class were Dr. Cynthia Annett and Ms. Heidi Mehl who are scientists that have done extensive water quality research in their home state of Kansas and in the Altay Republic in Siberia. Their presentation included discussion of the importance of scientists possessing cultural skills enabling them to work with local and indigenous communities in order to effectively manage water resources.



Van Orman and his colleague in Siberia, GASU English teacher Maria Ostanina of Gorno Altaysk, discussed monitoring of water quality, river and lake conservation, involving local community members in ecological management, and respecting and incorporating indigenous peoples' perspectives on responsible use of natural resources during the exchange.

Native Altaian students shared their traditional worldviews of nature including their belief that elements of nature have a spiritual essence. This perspective discourages people from taking more

than they need from animals, plant life, and other natural resources such as rivers, lakes and woodlands. Because of the pristine condition of it scenic and bountiful landscape the Altay Republic is a UNESCO World Heritage Protected Site. Like the Ozarks, the Altay Mountains attract a large number of tourists each year.



Spring Carnival Successful!

Ozarka College held a Spring Carnival on April 15, 2010 outside of the John E. Miller Education Complex. This year's event, which included free games, activities and food, was host to more than 800 people.

Some of the activities this year included the National Guard Rock Climbing Wall, drunk-driving simulator, face-painting, pick-up ducks, photo booth, dart throw, bean bag toss, grand-prize game, and a craft table.

One of the organizers for the event, Student Success Specialist, Jennifer Miller expresses her excitement of the success of the carnival. Ozarka Enforces Tobacco Policy

Ozarka College has adopted a policy to become a tobacco-free institution, including buildings, grounds and parking lots. The policy specifically states that no tobacco products of any type may be used, carried or distributed in any buildings, parking areas, grounds, facilities, vehicles or streets. (BPPM 2.41)


This policy was adopted after the State of Arkansas passed The Clean Indoor Air Act (Act 8 of 2006) which prohibits smoking in worksites and in public places to protect employees and the public from secondhand smoke. Arkansas was the seventeenth state in the nation to pass this type of smoke-free workplace act.

Ozarka will begin strictly enforcing the policy on June 1, 2010 and students, faculty and staff are expected not to use tobacco while on the grounds of Ozarka College. Violation of this policy will result in warnings and repeated violation could result in disciplinary action.
