AST and CAH Students Attend SkillUSA Competition

Students from Ozarka's Automotive Service Technology and Culinary Arts and Hospitality programs competed recently against students from other state vocational-technical institutes and colleges in the 39th annual Arkansas Association of Skills USA 2005 Championship Conference. The competition was held at the Hot Springs Convention Center on April 19th with an awards banquet on April 20th.

Greg Walton of Mountain View; Clayton White of Melbourne; and Kyle Yancey of Wideman, competed in the Automotive Service Technology category. This category requires students to compete in different automotive areas as well as a written and hands-on exam. Anthony Hunt of Bexar and Kasey Newman of Salem, com-

peted in Job Skill Demonstration which consisted of assembling and answering questions on a specific component in front of a panel of judges.

Nine Culinary students attended the conference, with eight of those competing and winning medals in their divisions. In the Commercial Baking category, Merideth Luter of Corning won Gold; Brian Allen of Batesville won Silver; and Bekki Taylor of Desha won Bronze.

In the Food and Beverage Service category, Kimberlee Bledsoe of Bald Knob won Gold for the second consecutive time, and Jose Aguilar of Fayetteville won Bronze.

Three students competed in the Culinary Arts category: Sean Reynolds of Mountain Home won Gold for the second year in a row; Brian Jones of Newport won Silver; and Derrick Baldridge of Mammoth Spring won Bronze.

Ozarka SkillsUSA Advisors, Automotive Service Technology instructor, Larry Wilkes; and Culinary Arts instructor, Chef Rick Tankersley, accompanied the students to Hot Springs. Tankerlsey served as the technical chair for this year's culinary competitions.

Assistant Culinary Arts instructor, Linda Taylor also attended and served as assistant chair for the baking competition. First year culinary student, Doug Ford of Wynne, assisted behind the scenes and says he plans to compete next year.

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Scholarship to Honor Crawford

Like so many who knew him, Janis Jones knows first-hand about the many acts of kindness offered to others by Honorable Harold Crawford and his wife, Susan. Out of her keen respect for Judge Crawford, Jones, a friend of the Crawford family for many years, has initiated a scholarship fund to honor the legacy of Crawford, who served from January 1999 to March 30, 2005, as the Sharp County Judge. Jones said "Because I knew Judge Crawford and had such respect for the work he did for others, I wanted to do something in the area that would be a lasting tribute to him".

That lasting tribute comes in the form of a scholarship endowment at Ozarka College. This

scholarship fund will be designed to support students living in Sharp County who want the opportunities available through higher education. The Ozarka College Foundation Board has agreed to coordinate this program with Jones, Mrs. Crawford and local county officials to establish the Harold Crawford Memorial Scholarship.

Ozarka College President Doug Rush expressed his enthusiasm for creating an endowment in honor of Judge Crawford. "Harold Crawford was a tremendous supporter of Ozarka College and as a visionary leader he truly recognized the importance of encouraging students to get a higher education. He was instrumental in Ozarka's service to Sharp County residents and we are very proud to administer a scholarship in his honor. Ozarka has many deserving students who can benefit from this gift of perpetuity by those who respected Judge Crawford's work."

While the details of the endowment and scholarship criteria are still being developed, Jones has suggested the funds be used in keeping with Crawford's tradition of helping 'at risk' students who have potential to succeed through education and training. Ozarka officials hope to be able to award the first scholarship for the Fall 2006 semester.

An account has been established with the college's Foundation Board and, for a period of time, donations will be matched dollar for dollar by a federal Title III Strengthening Institutions Grant. The Ozarka College Foundation is a 501 c 3 non-profit organization making donations to this endowment eligible for tax deduction.
